# ON THE JOURNEY WITH PASTOR PAT



As I mentioned in my May
Messenger article, FPC is entering
into a time of discernment where we
will spend time together learning,
exploring, dreaming, and
articulating who we are today and
where God is calling us in this
changing world around us. From
here, we will discern what type of

leadership we need to accompany us on this journey.

The first step in this process is to gather data and discern who we are, for real. To that end, Session has already begun gathering data about us. Looking broadly, who are we? We are gathering data about membership numbers, and demographics of the congregation and the surrounding community. What are the transformations that have taken place in the church and our culture? We will look at 20 years ago, 10 years ago, and 1980 vs 2023. The more information we have, the more we will better understand ourselves.

For this time of discernment, we need everyone's participation; we need to hear your voice! To be hearing from you, we will launch a Congregational Care Survey on August 6<sup>th</sup>. Please see the article in this newsletter explaining what this is all about. Rest assured there are several ways for you to participate – online and through paper copies. We have staff available to help anyone who

wants help. We need to hear from you!

There will be small group conversations where you can add your voice. And the Adult Education Team has saved one Sunday a month for me to come before you after worship and share what Session is learning as we enjoy open conversations.

But our discernment will not be "all about the numbers." For the months of August and September, during worship, we will engage Paul's letter to the Ephesians in an extended sermon series. This sermon series will be "all heart" as we dive into Paul's words about following Jesus in community. Worship will be all about growing in our faith and becoming a community in which God is beautifully at work. Stay tuned!

This is a very exciting time in the life of FPC. As I wrote in May, the world in 2023 looks different than it did in 2019. The church in 2023 looks different that it did in 2019. But I believe God is already at work making plans for FPC-plans for us to thrive and expand our mission work deeper and broader into the city and around the world. For 140 years, members of FPC have worked together to build the solid foundation upon which we will continue to grow and go out as faithful followers of Jesus. Now it is our turn to add our own new layer to this already firm foundation.

# WHAT WOULD JESUS DO?



Philippians 4:8-9 "Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable- if anything is excellent or praiseworthy- think about such things. Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me- put it into practice. And the God

of peace will be with you."

August is known to be a month when many individuals and families are transitioning. Maybe the kids or grandkids are going back to school, maybe some are heading off to college or starting their first career, others may be moving or changing jobs, starting to plan for their winter pilgrimage down south, or working on finding alternative assisted housing before winter hits again. No matter where you land on this continuum, this being your first big transition, or your last grand transition, you know the chaos, the mental and emotional disruptions, the sleepless nights, the higher anxiety, the worry and concern that can envelope you and halt you in your tracks, leaving you wondering what to do. We can be put into awkward situations or feel pressured to make decisions that we are totally unsure about. We can feel like we must go along with someone else's decision because sometimes we are afraid to speak up, or we don't really know what to do or what to say. Oftentimes we feel we are ill-prepared for this moment. So what are some ways we can feel better about what we say, what we do, or the decisions we have to make? One thing that I often do when I am stuck, frustrated or lost-all those who know me can attest to hearing me say this is-"What would Jesus do?" or better yet "What would Jesus have me do?" As trite as it sounds, it really does help me to change my frame of mind, my frame of reference, and helps me to center my solution towards God and what God would have me do! Besides asking ourselves "What would Jesus do?" or more specifically "What would Jesus have me do?" we could also ask the following questions: "Am I now trying to win the approval of men, or of God (Galatians 1:10)? Does this decision further Jesus' mission or hinder it? Am I being the visible face of Christ in this moment? Would this decision make others worry about me? Do I need to reach out for help on this one?" We can ask all or some of these questions and then we can make an informed decision based on our faith. We trust God to guide us, but even if an individual decision does not turn out to be the best decision it could have

been, we can take heart in knowing that we trusted God's continuing love and care for us to the point that we stopped to ponder what to do in His name, and will perhaps know better what to do next time. So whether you are worried about new first days, new friends and teachers, new cities, new houses, new careers or deadend careers, new relationships or struggling relationships, new health challenges or chronic health challenges, new life or a new death, take a moment to have a conversation with God, saying "God, I need you on this one because this is hard, really, really hard, but God, what would you have me do?" Sometimes the answers are immediate, other times we wait. Be patient, be listening, keep asking, keep praying, and then be on the lookout for the answer, because we all know that God works in mysterious ways, and that He often puts others in our path to help lead us to our answers.

# JULY SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

At the July meeting the Session welcomed new Elders Meredith DeCou, Amy Engebretson, and Tom Nicholson. The Session rejoiced over the approval of three baptisms and 11 new congregation members.

Session recognized Noah Amundson-Reiter for diligently helping with the elderly members coming into services.

The fiscal year (FY) 2022-2023 giving was \$757,033. For FY 2021-2022, the total was \$808,593. The FY 2022-2023 giving was approximately 9% below the yearly average of the previous four fiscal years. A draft budget was presented based upon current personnel costs and requests from ministry teams. The proposed budget was discussed and requires additional revision before adoption.

An update of the long-term renters was presented to the Session, including the updating pricing effective July 1, 2023. Anticipated annual revenue from these contracts is approximately \$48,000.

Director of Facilities Jacob Forstein also presented several other building-related items. The Session authorized expenditures for several repairs, including the Sanctuary projectors and HVAC items in the Kingdom Kids and Sunday School areas.

Rev. Hammond presented a quick overview of the transition planning. One initial step will be a survey about Congregational Care needs to be sent out during August. The survey will be online, but there will be additional response methods available.

Also, this Spring, we hired Kate Hruby to serve the congregation as the temporary Youth Director. At that time, we shared that Kate would be with us through August. We are happy to report that Kate will be with us until next Spring or until we hire a new Director of Youth Ministry. The Director of Youth Ministry Search Team has been very busy searching for someone who will come alongside our youth and lead them in their spiritual journeys. Kate has done an amazing job leading our youth ministry program over the past year.

# PEACEWORKS SEWING MINISTRY



Summer is always an exciting time for the Peaceworks sewers. We anticipate students coming to eagerly visit and learning to sew. We have worked with some of the same girls for three or four years now and they are becoming experts and enjoying doing projects to help others. The girls began by making Foster Care Bags. Since the girls had made pillowcases be-

fore, they needed little reminders of how to make these bags. They made a pillowcase and added a handle for the children to carry their clothes home from the *Foster Care Closet*. The young women have also worked on pillows made to look like a dog bone and are making cosmetic bags to carry their makeup supplies to middle school. Class times go way too fast and we are always wishing for more time to spend with the youth.

The sewing group always amazes me! We receive an urgent request, and they are busy filling that request. At the end of June, the *Foster Care Closet* sent out a plea for bags. I had just delivered 60 bags to them less than two weeks before. When I questioned the director, Holly, she told me they used forty bags in two days and needed more. Our sewers got busy and started sewing. When I returned from vacation two weeks later, I had 90 bags to be taken over to the Closet thanks to some very caring, industrious women who love to sew! Besides the bags, they have

also been busy making water bottle holders, laundry bags, projects for the veteran's tiny homes, microwave bowls, and purses made from the legs of jeans.



### PRESBY READERS

Presby Readers like to read. For nine months they commit to read the selected book of the month. What's the history of FPC's Book Club, aka Presby Readers? Mel Roos said, "I think FPC's Book Club has been going on for close to 30 years. Ruth Parry, Janet Brady and I met and agreed that a book club would be a good social gathering for the church and thus the Book Club was begun and became quite a hit. Even though I am no longer able to attend book club, I still read all the books. In the past, I enjoyed the fellowship of the meetings and I appreciated that books that I would never have read are chosen for discussion. I think there is still quite a following in the congregation from those who cannot or are unable to attend but still enjoy reading."

Mary Wilson says that gaining insight from other readers often has her saying, "Wow—I never thought of it that way. Or, I totally missed that point. Or, that's what that meant!"

Diane Helin said, "I'd not belonged to a book club before but I like the selections because they are recommended and voted on by the participants and because they expand my reading in directions that I might not go to on my own."

Linda Rasmussen became the leader of Presby Readers in 2016 following Sue Parker. Linda said, "Records show the number of books read since 1995 is over 250! In recent years, attendance is 10-14 each month. We are fortunate in that each year, FPC library purchases at least one copy of each book selected for the year." Linda also said, "I personally have loved reading since I was very young but feel that I have become a much broader reader of different genres because of book club!"

Presby Readers is made up of not only members from FPC, but friends of FPC. Former staff member Roxie Huber is one of those friends. She said, "The best thing about book club, in my view, is getting to hear the perspectives others draw from books we read. Some of the books chosen are not ones I would have selected but I still show up to see everyone, visit and hear the discussion."

Check out the book selections for 2023-2024. That selection includes the One Book South Dakota read for the month of September. Each year the SD Humanities Council chooses a book for South Dakotans to read. This year the book is "The Seed Keeper" by Diane Wilson. "The Seed Keeper", a novel set in the Midwest, follows a Dakota family's struggle to preserve their way of life, and their sacrifices to protect

what matters most. Copies of the book, available through the Humanities Council, will be able to be "checked out" to read. Lori Walsh of In the Moment on SDPB, will lead the Presby Reader's discussion of the book on Thursday, September 8. All are welcome. Books are available at First Presbyterian Church on a first come first served basis.

You might find that you want to become involved with this group. Men and women are welcome. All ages are welcome. Members of FPC and non-members are welcome. Presby Readers meet the second Thursday of every month except July, August and December. It may be the perfect time to get started on Presby Readers' reading list. "The Seed Keeper" is a good place to begin.

### LAUNDRY WITH LOVE

On June 27 our FPC congregation was responsible once again for communicating God's love by providing meals and laundry money to Laundry With Love guests.

Laundry With Love was established in 2018 under the umbrella of Church on the Street. We come alongside those who are homeless/struggling financially/hungry and feel God at work. The generosity of the FPC congregation makes this happen.

That day from 3-8 at The Laundromat on 3rd and Cliff, 11 FPC members (Lynne Acheson, Sue Holmes, Andrea Boerighter, Mary Nettleman, Judy Mulock, Peri Erdmann, Lyn Halvorson, Jean Nicholson, Tom Nicholson, Don Hoekman, Anja Hoekman) represented FPC. Since we began serving at LWL, 42 different FPC members (plus many repeating) have participated.

On the 27th, 54 families were able to do 374 loads of laundry free of cost. We served a record 158 meals, which was attributed to the nice weather, presence of the Mobile Hair Clinic (providing free haircuts), end-of-the-month financial struggles...and the reputation of FPC meals. We have always provided a very good meal (including cans of Mt. Dew and Pepsi, a rare treat). We have always said "yes" to anyone who has come for a meal, whether they are doing laundry or not. We have always said "yes" to anyone who asks for an extra to-go box for "my mother in the car" or



"my 2 children at home." We build that into the food amounts. You can't look into the eyes of someone wanting food and not think about what Jesus would (and did) do.



As one FPC helper said, "It's very apparent the guests appreciate this. It's such a blessing to interact with Sioux Falls neighbors that we normally wouldn't have the chance to meet. I wish more FPC members could experience this and

see how well their quarters get used!"

We will be at LWL again this fall, thanking God for the opportunity to serve!

CELEBRATING 35 YEARS
OF PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

July 31, 2023 was a special day for Presbyterian Women. This date commemorated 35 years of reunited ministry.

Here is a bit of history of the organization: Presbyterian Women is a unique network whose roots trace back to women's societies of the 1780s, organizing even before our Presbyterian predecessors held their first General Assembly. In 1982 the United Presbyterian Church of the USA (UPCUSA) and the Presbyterian Church of the US (PCUS) joined, becoming the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America (PCUSA). In 1988 two organizations of strong Presbyterian women of our denomination, United Presbyterian Women (UPW) and Women of the Church (WOC), merged, giving birth to Presbyterian Women.

Presbyterian Women is a bold organization that learns, gives, leads, and supports the church and the world through Bible study, mission, prayer, and more! It continues a rich history of living out the expansive, loving, and just call of Christ to serve all.

In His Steps: Pathways for Peace walks in the footsteps of Jesus in the places where he carried out his ministry. We meet the local people and hear their stories. Through prayer and reflection, we ask ourselves how Jesus would have us respond to the people we encounter today?

We have discovered young 14-year-old girls with late-stage breast cancer, and 70% of the women diagnosed are already late stage. Christy Reiners has been serving here for 23 years to develop trusted networks of care to help provide what is needed. We are currently developing a Patient Navigation program for Breast Cancer that helps the women and their families overcome barriers to getting early detection with access to resources and quality treatment.

Come with us on this journey and be part of Jesus' hands and feet that are having such a powerful impact in rural and remote villages in the Holy Land.
