SESSION FEBRUARY HIGHLIGHTS

The Session was busy during the beginning of March. Session members met informally with the Personnel Ministry Team (PMT) on March 10 to hear about PMT's recommendation to expand their search criteria from what is called a "bridge" pastor to also include "transition" pastors. One notable difference is that transition pastors often work on an initial one-year contract while bridge pastors work month-to-month. At the Stated Session meeting on March 12, the Session voted to affirm this recommendation from PMT. Paul Gillaspey from PMT and Elder Eric Wells then met with the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) on March 18 to communicate this decision to them. Since most PCUSA Pastor searches take over a year, it is unlikely that PNC's work will be delayed by the possible presence of a transition pastor, and such a person might be able to provide additional support to the PNC, and the entire congregation, during the interim period.

To date, 105 annual pledges have been received for an approximate total of \$455,000. The average per pledge (\$4,338) is up about 7% from last year (\$4,036), but there are currently about 20 fewer pledges this year than last. It is not unusual for the last few pledges to come in over the next few months.

February represents 8 months into the current fiscal year. A summary year-to-date comparison between FY 2022-2023 and FY 2023-2024 of actual income and expenses is shown in the table.

The difference in total income is a result of higher interest rates and building use fees this year. The year-to-year expense comparison is not completely fair because a large number of facility-related expenses occurred in the final third of FY 2022-2023, so it is anticipated that by the end of the year the total expenses for the two years will be similar. In FY 2022-2023, expenses exceeded both the budget plan and total income, and if the FY 2023-2024 trends continue, that will be the case again this year. In both years, facility costs were the major item exceeding budget plans. During the last two years, giving fell from April through June. Session is watching that trend as we begin to prepare a budget for the fiscal year beginning in July.

Due to excessive overhead (16%) and an inability for the Presbytery of South Dakota to distinguish between mission and non-mission spending, Session voted to terminate FPC participation in the PCUSA shared mission giving program in FY 2024-25 and retain those monies in the Good Samaritan Fund until alternative missions are identified. This will allow FPC to maintain its tithing principle with 10% of the budget going to direct mission support. FPC will continue to contribute its normal per-capita apportionment.

Elders Bobbi Lower and Amy Engebretson were joined on the Nominating Committee by new members Alex Anderson, Jo Erickson, and Warren DeCou. One of their first actions was to repopulate the Finance Team (Phil DeGroot, Rachel Pay, John Ulmer, and Alvina Van Veldhuizen), and they are now looking to find four Elders and four Deacons for election in June. Session thanks the members who have volunteered to serve. If you have names of prospective Elders and Deacons, or would be interested in serving yourself, please contact any member of the Nominating Committee.

Each month, Session takes a moment to officially recognize a church volunteer. This month, Session recognized Pam Koepsell for preparing the water for baptisms and taking special care to find the appropriate temperature to sooth the infants. Session reflected that Pam's work is symbolic of the many small, often unseen, acts that help FPC fulfill its mission.

EMOTIONS DEVOTION

<u>Philippians 4:6</u> Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God.

How many times have we seen this scripture text, read it, repeated it, and then ignored it? As a mother, a father, or a teenager, how many times did you feel the need to hide your emotions in order to appear "strong and put together?" How often did you cry in your car or the shower or out on a walk so that nobody else could hear you? When was the last time you erupted with anger in an instant only to regret your words and actions later? How often do you fear what's before you? And when was the last time you were able to name the emotion that was tugging at you and pulling you under?

Naming our emotions can be difficult, overwhelming, and painful, so instead we smile and fake it until we make it, right? But what impact does that have on our physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual selves? At what point do we cross from our true authentic selves in Christ to an unrecognizable version of ourselves in Christ, to our eventually fake selves pretending for Christ?

Every emotion you experience is important because it is trying to tell you something. God did not intend for us to hide behind or stuff our emotions but bring them to him in prayer and petition. Emotions can be seen and felt throughout the entire Bible. In fact, according to the Brigham Young University exhibition aptly titled "Jesus Wept: Emotions in the Scriptures," 127 emotion words and their various conjugations appear 9,685 times across a total of 7,238 verses. Wow, that's a lot! It's apparent that our God is an emotional God; He was not void of feelings, nor was Jesus. David, possibly the most emotional being in the whole Bible, rode his emotions like a roller coaster. But what David also displayed throughout scripture, was the ability to identify, name, and describe his emotions and feelings and take them to God. Part of loving God with our whole heart, mind, body, and soul therefore must include intentionality towards our inner and outer emotional selves.

When we stuff our emotions, we ruminate, and our minds can become obsessed with thoughts. Positive thoughts turn negative, our hearts start to retreat, little things turn into big things, and we become distant, unforgiving and eventually











resentful. Then the physical symptoms start to arise, your blood pressure starts to creep up, your aches and pains start to intensify, your chest gets tight or starts to flutter. Your thoughts become scattered, you start to get headaches, and sleep-nope, nada, not tonight. The body begins to suffer.

God wants us to know, that we are perfectly imperfect in His eyes. God created us to have emotions, to feel those emotions, and to survive those emotions. Christ tells us His power is made perfect in weakness (2 Corinthians 12:7-10) and begs us to bring all our cares, concerns, worries, and fears and lay them at His feet. As we look to God as our beacon, God anchors us, and our perspectives begin to shift. He helps to guide us beyond the present circumstances and helps us to focus on the life He meant us to live. God is the peace, love, joy, and the hope that comes in the morning. In Him we find strength to weather the storms of life.

I recently saw this saying: Watch your thoughts, they become your words; watch your words, they become your actions; watch your actions, they become your habits; watch your habits, they become your character; watch your character, it becomes your destiny.

The Bible teaches that our emotions are controlled by our thoughts, but are you listening and perceiving those thoughts and emotions today?

Peace I leave you, my peace I give you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid. John14:27

Later in the month of April you will see a display in the Narthex that addresses emotional health and how our spirituality plays an important role in that health. This display will rotate every couple of weeks to help lead us through an emotionally healthy spiritual journey. Please take a moment to stop and interact with the display, take what you need, and take time to deeply reflect on your own emotional and mental health or that of someone you love. The display will be for adults and children. Watch for additional classes and information too!

MARCH CHILDREN'S OFFERING

The Children's Offering during the month of April is REACH. REACH Literacy's mission is to empower adults and children to thrive through literacy education. REACH's "Pathways to Promotion" or workplace literacy program focuses on basic skills workers need to retain or advance their careers. Their BEE a Reader program pairs volunteers with second graders in the Sioux Falls area to grow both confidence and reading abilities. REACH's bookstore, located on the back side of the Western Mall provides affordable books as well as many events to encourage literacy in the community. The proceeds of this secondhand bookstore go towards their "Pathways to Promotion" and "BEE a Reader". The bookstore also provides 5 free books for any child visiting as well as resources and book grants for educators.



ADAMS SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS

Presbyterian Women of FCP is now accepting applications for the Adams Scholarship.
