


## A MOMENT WITH PASTOR PAT



During this season of Lent, we have been watching the life of Jesus unfold through the eyes of his disciple – Simon Peter. Peter was a very normal human being who chose to follow Jesus and did the very best he could. He tried to figure out what it meant to be a follower of Jesus. Sometimes he was spot on in his actions and other times, well, not so much. But Peter kept going. He kept trying to be a good follower. He kept searching and yearning and loving. Peter dropped his fishing nets and followed Jesus, he had faith and then doubted, he recognized Jesus as the Messiah, the Son of the living God, and he betrayed his Lord and friend by denying he ever knew him. **March 3** – Third Sunday in Lent. This day we celebrate The Lord’s Supper. Read Matthew 16:13-20 and imagine a sermon titled, “Praise the Mount.” Matthew 16:18: *“And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church . . .”*

**New Member Gathering.** Those interested in joining the church will meet immediately after worship with Pastor Pat and several Elders and Deacons. Grab a cup of coffee and a donut hole and meet in the Lounge for a time of conversation.

**March 10** – Fourth Sunday in Lent and Gifts of Women Sunday. Read Matthew 16:21-23 and imagine a sermon titled, “I’m Fixed Upon It.” Matthew 16:22b-23: *Jesus turned and said to Peter,*

*“Get behind me Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.”*  
**New Members will be received during worship.**

**March 17** – Fifth Sunday in Lent. This day we celebrate a baptism! Read Matthew 18:15-22 and imagine a sermon titled, “Teach Me.” Matthew 18:21: *Then Peter came and said to him, “Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive?”*

**March 24** – Palm Sunday (Beginning of Holy Week) Read Matthew 21:1-11 and John 12:12-16.

**March 28** – Maundy Thursday. Join your church family in the Covenant Center for a potluck and The Lord’s Supper. We will begin to gather at 5:30pm with plans to eat at 6:00pm. Read John 13:1-38.

**March 29** – Good Friday worship service at 7:00pm. Reread John 13:31-38. Read John, chapters 18 and 19.

**March 31** – The Resurrection of the Lord/Easter Sunday. We will have two services Easter morning:

**Easter sunrise service at 7:00am** in the Choir Room

**Easter Celebration at 9:30am** in the sanctuary. Be sure to come early to listen to an extended prelude and flower the cross as you enter the sanctuary. Read Luke 24:1-12.

## SESSION FEBRUARY HIGHLIGHTS

The Session met twice this month, once in a special meeting with the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) and Paul Gillaspey, who represented the Personnel Ministry Team (PMT). That meeting was devoted mostly to general planning for the tasks of searching for a bridge pastor and an installed pastor. Session empowered the PMT to run the search for the bridge pastor with Paul Gillaspey serving as chair of that search.

During the regular Session meeting, the Session approved the Ministry Discernment Profile (MDP) prepared by the PMT for use in the search for the bridge pastor. The MDP is the informational form that pastors view on the PCUSA system when looking for open positions. Once the MDP is approved by the Presbytery, the search for the bridge pastor will be active.

The Session, in consultation with the PMT, approved the general parameters of the staffing plan for the interim period following Pastor Pat's retirement and the point when a bridge pastor might arrive. Briefly, the pulpit will be filled by Rev. Mike McCallum and Rev. Everett Bosch on a rotating basis during May, June, and July. Pending approval from Presbytery, Revs. Bosch and McCallum will moderate Session and Congregational meetings. Session is deeply grateful to Mike and Everett for taking on these tasks. Kathie Douma will lead the weekly worship planning meetings for the staff, and Paul Gillaspey has graciously volunteered to provide administrative leadership for the staff as needed. The Deacons anticipate an increased role in areas related to congregational care, supporting Congregational Care Coordinator Jana Phelps.

Have you noticed that it has been warm in the Sanctuary recently? This is because some control valves in the heating system have failed. Session voted to authorize the facilities team to spend an estimated \$14,400 to address this problem. The facilities team also communicated to Session that the fire alarm system upgrades needed to reach compliance with building codes will need to be done sooner than previously estimated. Session also reviewed a quote for audio/visual system upgrades throughout the building. Finally, the Session affirmed the continued use of the building as a voting location for elections.

Elders Amy Engebretson and Bobbi Lower will be seeking to repopulate the nominating committee in preparation for searching for the next classes of Elders and Deacons, who will be elected in June. If you have a desire to serve in any of these roles, please let Amy, Bobbi, or any member of the Session know.

Despite the busy agenda for both meetings, the Session took some time to acknowledge the many ways the congregation is carrying out FPC's vision. As just one example, Pastor Pat commended the Deacons and Youth for their outreach to our neighbors and home-bound members.

## SERVICE-LEARNING PROJECT

Our fourteen elementary students working on the Service-Learning Project were forced to make some challenging decisions together as the group noticed our ending date was quickly approaching. The easy part of their decision, to help kids in the foster care system, was a unanimous decision. Deciding HOW to help was tricky because the kids had too many great ideas and the group wanted to do ALL of them. After lots of thoughtful discussion and hard work listening to each other, the group decided to help with two projects that would NOT require a fundraiser.

1. The kids called the **Family Visitation Center** and offered to shop for supplies and assemble Birthday Bags. This project was the Children's Offering in worship for the month of February. Family Visitation Center eagerly agreed to let the kids use the funds and do the work to assemble Birthday Bags. Each student in our group went shopping and purchased a gift they would like to receive at this time in their life AND a gift they would have enjoyed when they were younger. In all, our kids assembled 30 Birthday Bags.
2. Our students realized that almost all of them had clothes or other items that could be donated to the **Foster Closet**. This was meaningful to our group because they wanted to help provide necessities, items that all kids REALLY need! The students will collect items through the month of March. Items for donation can be placed in the wood donation cupboard in the narthex.



But, this group of kids is NOT finished yet. THESE KIDS are already finding ways to do MORE!

Kendall and Katelyn are 2nd and 4th year Girl Scouts. Their grandma wanted to support them in making their sales goals but is unable to have cookies. Grandma decide to give each girl a set amount of money toward cookies and the girls could decide what to do with the cookies.






## GIFTS OF WOMEN SUNDAY

## ONGOING OFFERINGS OF PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

There are 3 offerings specific to Presbyterian Women, and one ecumenical offering in which our local PWC participates. The following will provide some information about each of these offerings.

**The Birthday Offering** was launched in 1922 to honor the 10th anniversary of the Women's Auxiliary in the PC in the US. It is an annual tradition for givers and receivers around the world, usually collected in the spring. Over the last 101 years, grants funded by PW have impacted the ministries of more than 200 organizations and transformed the lives of countless people. Recipients for 2024 include Advocates for Community Choice in Marthasville, Missouri & Shawnee Presbyterian Church in Louisville, Kentucky.

**The Thank Offering** provides women with a tangible way to express their gratitude for special blessings in their lives. Grants from the Thank Offering range from \$5,000 to \$50,000. Notably, at least 40% of donations are dedicated to health ministries; the remaining 60% funds new creative ideas for missions. In 2023, 28 applications were received; 7 projects were chosen for funding – 6 in the United States and one international. This offering is collected in the fall.

**Cents-Ability** was begun in 1976 by Presbyterian Women to involve individuals and families in a corporate response to world hunger. This offering is one way that families, congregations, and presbyteries can support the battle against hunger and poverty. Every person is invited to contribute a few cents for every meal – some groups suggest 5 cents. Funds are then used to support local hunger ministries, as well as national and international projects through the Presbyterian Hunger Program.

**The Fellowship of the Least Coin** is a global ecumenical prayer movement for justice, peace, and reconciliation led by Christian women for women and girls all over the world. As tokens of prayer, women are encouraged to set aside the least coin in their country's currency. Every year, the FLC Fund is disbursed as grants for education, projects that empower women and girls, ending gender-based violence and poverty, and relief in times of natural and human-made disasters. This offering began in 1956 and was founded by Shanti Solomon.

## 75 YEARS OF SHARING: HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

It was in 1949 that an hour-long radio appeal on a Sunday morning during Lent reached the stated goal of \$1,000,000. These gifts were used to provide relief to European communities ravaged by WWII. The success of that appeal has resulted in a large ecumenical effort to provide assistance to many around the world.

One Great Hour of Sharing is the single, largest way that Presbyterians come together every year to work for a better world. The offering is used in three distinct ways. **Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA)** works alongside communities as they recover and find hope after the devastation of natural or human-caused disasters and also supports refugees. **The Presbyterian Hunger Program (PHP)** takes action to alleviate hunger and to care for God's creation. **Self-Development of People (SDOP)** invests in communities and responds to experiences of oppression, poverty and injustice.



In celebration of this 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary, I am encouraging everyone to think about the significance of the number 75. A gift of \$75.00 will provide a fishing kit for a fisherman so that he may feed his family (SDOP). A gift of 75 cents

each day during Lent (40 days) will total \$30.00 which will provide educational supplies for 3 students in a refugee camp (PDA). A gift of \$75.00 each week for the 6 weeks of Lent will provide \$450.00 for nutrition, filling meals for 30 households headed by women (PHP).

One Great Hour of Sharing gifts are collected each year during the season of Lent. Suggestions for giving will be listed each week in the FPC "In The Know" mailing. Watch for your email each Friday morning. Envelopes are available in the pew racks.

**Think 75. 75 cents each day or each week. \$75 as a single gift or \$75 each week (\$450). \$750 as a one-time gift.**
